SHARE

- Post social media messages every day or every week throughout April to raise awareness about abuse prevention.
- Share the **USCCB Resources** on abuse prevention throughout the month.
- Share child abuse prevention <u>resources</u> from the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

PRAY

- Schedule time throughout the month to say a **Rosary** for victims/survivors of abuse.
- Celebrate a <u>Holy Hour for Healing</u> for victims/survivors of abuse and reconciliation for the Church.
- Take time before or after Mass to recognize those who have both trained others in safe environment programs and those who have been trained.

BLUE PINWHEELS

Blue Pinwheels are the universal sign of innocence, and therefore child abuse prevention.

Mark April by hosting your own pinwheel event!

The Pinwheel is the national symbol of child abuse prevention efforts. It represents the innocence, joy and fun which should be the experience of all children. Planting Pinwheels on the grounds of the church or school leaves behind a dramatic, visual, public display of support for protecting all of God's children from any kind of harm.

- A Pinwheel Event can be anything to bring a solemn reminder of child abuse prevention efforts, such as a prayer service, or the planting of a "Pinwheel Garden." You can do this virtually too!
- Remember to share your virtual or in-person pinwheel gardens on social media!



Advice for hosting your pinwheel event virtually

- Host a <u>prayer service</u> via video conferencing to raise awareness virtually.
- A Pinwheel Event can be anything to bring a solemn reminder of child abuse prevention efforts, such as a prayer service, or the planting of a "Pinwheel Garden." You can do this virtually too!

No Hit Zone Event

Encourage your diocesan pastoral center, parishes and schools to become a "No Hit Zone."

A No Hit Zone sets a precedent within the community and establishes a commitment to the promotion of effective parenting techniques by instilling:

- No adult shall hit a child
- No child shall hit another child
- No adult shall hit another adult
- No child shall hit an adult

HOMILY HELPS

Talking Points

- Throughout the Gospel, Christ calls upon His followers to care for the most vulnerable among us, especially children.
- Our faith also calls for us to uphold the value of human life and the dignity of the human person. The protection of children is the responsibility of the entire Church, including the faithful. The protection of children and youth from abuse and other harm is a respect life issue, and we must all do our part to uphold this ideal.
- During Child Abuse Prevention Month, we are reminded of the call to be instruments of justice, working for the common good of all, which includes the protection of children. As Jesus entrusts to Peter the care of the flock, we are reminded that this responsibility belongs to everyone as a matter of charity and justice.
- Child Abuse Prevention Month should lead to heightened awareness of the need to be vigilant about providing a safe environment for all within the Church and for our communities.
- Recent statistics tell us one out of every four girls, and one out of every six boys, are sexually abused before they turn 18. If those statistics are correct, on every Sunday in our congregation are people who have been abused and may continue to experience the pain of that abuse. Reaching out to all victims/survivors of abuse is critical in bringing hope and the love of Christ to them. Our diocese is here to provide anyone suffering from abuse with steps towards healing.
- We are all part of a larger culture of protection and healing within the Church. As members of this culture, we value the prevention of abuse and the support of those who have been abused. Each one of us can play an important role in strengthening this culture. For example, we can better prevent abuse by ensuring that the signs of abuse are identified and reported. Noticing these warning signs, taking them seriously, and reporting them could prevent abuse in the future. Even when we witness inappropriate behavior or something that just doesn't seem quite right, we must report our concerns through the appropriate channels.
- We can also play a role in victim outreach by offering support, compassion, and prayers to those close to us who have been abused. The importance we place on carrying out these acts of charity will go a long way in creating a culture within our Church where children are safe, and victim/survivors find healing.




What's happening in your diocese to protect the most vulnerable?

- We report all allegations of abuse directly to law enforcement and cooperate with civil authorities on all investigations.
- Our diocese has a designated Victim Assistance Coordinator whose primary role is to accompany survivors and provide resources for their healing journey.
- We also have an independent review board, consisting primarily of lay members. The role of the review board is to review allegations and make a recommendation to the bishop regarding the suitability for ministry.
- We train adults on how to maintain a safe environment and how to report concerns.
- We train minors in parish religious education programs and in Catholic schools to identify warning signs of abuse and inappropriate behavior, as well as how to report abuse.
- By following all of our diocesan policies and procedures to create safe environments, we can maintain a culture of protection and healing.

What's happening nationally to protect the most vulnerable?

- The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has two bodies committed to the influence of policies regarding child and youth protection: the Committee on the Protection of Children and Young People where all members are bishops, and the National Review Board in which all members are lay people who have elements of expertise in the field of child and youth protection.
- There is a Victim Assistance Coordinator and Safe Environment Coordinator in every diocese.
- The Annual Audit, currently conducted by StoneBridge Business Partners, evaluates the success of child and youth protection procedures, and trainings throughout the audit year.
- Diocesan Review Boards are in place in every diocese to review allegations of abuse and advise the bishop.
- All adult volunteers, clergy, and staff must receive safe environment training.
- All children must receive safe environment training.



- In 1982, President Reagan proclaimed April to be the first National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and that tradition continues today. This April, take a moment to learn what you can do to prevent abuse **here**.
- If you suffered abuse, it was not your fault. If you are a victim of sexual abuse by a priest, deacon, or individual representing the Catholic Church, there are several things you can do:
 - Contact the appropriate law enforcement agency, which can help determine options for making a criminal complaint.
 - o Contact a local child protection agency, a private attorney, a support group, an abuse hotline, or a mental health professional.
 - Contact a diocesan or eparchial <u>victim assistance coordinator</u> who is available to help victims/survivors make a formal complaint of abuse to the diocese or eparchy. The Victim Assistance Coordinator is also available to arrange a personal meeting with the bishop or his representative and to obtain support for the needs of the individual and families.
 - If you believe someone is in imminent danger or there is a situation of current abuse involving a minor please call 911.
 - To report an allegation of abuse or mishandling of allegations of sexual abuse by a bishop please visit the **Catholic Bishop Abuse Reporting** Service website.
- Research estimates 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys will be sexually abused before they turn 18. Take safe environment training to learn how to identify and prevent abuse!

Ten Tips for Protecting Children and Offering Outreach to Victims/Survivors

Sexual abuse is about the victim. Many people are affected by abuse but the individual most impacted is the victim who has suffered a violation of trust that can affect his or her entire life.

The residual effects of having been abused can last a lifetime.

The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place. Those who have been abused can heal, but if often takes time, therapy, and the support of loved ones.

3 No one has the right to have

No one has the right to have access to children.

No one, no matter who they are, has an automatic right to be around children or young people who are in the care of the Church without proper screening and without following the rules.

Common sense is not all that common.

Dioceses, schools, parishes, and especially families, must educate themselves and others on how to protect children.

Child sexual abuse can be prevented. Child sexual abuse can be prevented. It is critical to build safety barriers around children and young people to keep them from harm-such as protective guardians, codes of conduct, background evaluations, policies and procedures, and safety training programs.

Feeling heard leads toward healing. Relief from hurt and anger often comes when one feels heard, when one's pain

and concerns are taken seriously, and a victim/survivor's suffering, pain, and anger are acknowledged.

You cannot always predict who will be an abuser.

Experience shows that most abuse is committed by someone who has gained the trust of a victim/survivor and his/her family.

There are behavioral warning signs of child abusers.

Some abusers is loate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lawih gifts, others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approxe, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs, and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling.

People can be taught to identify

People can be taught to identify grooming behavior.

Grooming behaviors are the actions which abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into an inapropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.

Background checks are important.

Background checks in churches, schools and other organizations keep predators away from children both because they scare off some predators and because they uncover past actions which should ban an adult from working or volunteering with children.







to protect your children from sexual abuse

Parents play the primary role in educating their children about sexual abuse. Here are 5 tips for teaching safety to the little ones God has entrusted to you.

Keep it practical. Teach your children the differences between safe touches and

Tell your children that saying "no" is okay. Empower your children to say "no" if anyone makes

them feel uncomfortable or touches them inappropriately


Give your children a way to alert you. Tell your children they can use an excuse or share a special "code-word" with you to to alert you about an unsafe person or situation.

Tell your children to report an unsafe touch. Let your children know they

should tell you if they feel around any adult or peer. You can also identify other adults they can tell about

trust them. If your child makes a report to you, believe him or her. Tell them it is not their fault and that you love them. Immediately bring the allegation to the attention of










SAMPLE PETITIONS

- For those who have suffered abuse, that they may experience God's profound love for them and God's healing powers, we pray to the Lord...
- For those who provide help for the abused: counselors, therapists, and advocates that they may act with wisdom and compassion in their healing ministry, we pray to the Lord...
- For those affected by abuse in anyway, that they may have the courage to tell their story, to reach for healing, we pray to the Lord...
- For any child who may be suffering from abuse, that they may find the courage to tell a trusted adult so the abuse can be stopped, and so they can begin the journey toward healing, we pray to the Lord...

- For those who cannot love; save, heal and protect them, O Lord!
- For those whose hearts are filled with fear; save, heal and protect them,
 O Lord!
- After the intercessions and litany, the minister, in the following or similar words, invites all present to sing or say the Lord's Prayer.

The Lord heals our wounds and strengthens us in our weakness; let us pray as Christ has taught us:

All: Our Father...

• Blessing and Dismissal:

Lord God, Your own Son was delivered into the hands of the wicked, yet He prayed for His persecutors and overcame hatred with His Blood on the cross. Relieve the suffering of those present today (or name); grant them (him/her) peace of mind and a renewed faith in Your protection and care. Protect us all from the violence of others, keep us safe from the weapons of hate, and restore to us tranquility and peace. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

May God bless us with His mercy, strengthen us with His love, and enable us to walk in charity and peace.
