We parked the truck to unload, and we were greeted by fellow Knights of Columbus and Emmaus Brothers to help us, the unloading was completed in little time. The men then gave us lunch and drink, the company and food were great. This parish was vibrant joyful and thankful for our donations. We met with the priest, and he shared with us some of the history of the church. We took several pictures of the inside of the church and us with the priest.

This truly was a heartfelt project both collecting of the donations as well the delivery to these people in need.

I want to give credit to one of Knights of Columbus who started this project and was there every step of the way, Knight Salavador Sastres, a man of faith and caring. To every man who faithfully gave his time and energy to this worthy cause. It showed the meaning of being a Knight to everyone.



Señor de Los Milagros Mass

Thursday's 8 a.m. Mass was dedicated to the Knights of Columbus and the St. Joseph Icon that is making its rounds throughout the State. Pastor Father John Tizio celebrated the Mass, assisted by Council 4934 Chaplain Father Aldrin Nunes and Deacon Lou Bartos.

The Parish recently received a statue of St. Joseph, and used the Mass with the Icon to dedicate the statue for permanent display in the sanctuary.

The Icon was also prominently displayed at all Masses during the Oct. 29-30 weekend, with many of the more than 600 parishioners taking time to reflect and pray with the icon after the Masses.

. "It was a wonderful experience, and everyone was thankful to the Knights for making it available to the Church," said Grand Knight Art Klobucar.

This is part of the order's pilgrim icon prayer program, continuing a tradition in which every few years a new icon is selected to inspire the Knights and their communities. Copies of the icon are distributed to each of the KofC's more than 75 jurisdictions, and travel from council to council. Councils will use the icon as centerpieces for prayer services.

The program began in 1979 with Our Lady of Guadalupe. Since then, more than 175,000 prayer services have been held with about 22 million participants. This particular icon was made by Elizabeth Bergeron and based on a drawing by Alexandre Sobolev, of St. Joseph holding the child Jesus from St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal, Canada. KofC Supreme Knight presented a copy of the icon to Pope Francis last October.

Copies of the icon are making their way through the State of Florida, a journey that will conclude next August at the KofC Supreme Convention in Orlando.

Community Days. After 1,965 plastic ducks were "liberated" on the City Center Lake, Knights using a paddle boat and kayak "rescued" four of them. Andree Ann Roch of Montreal was the owner of the first-place duck, and won \$1,000. Second place, worth \$500, went to Erik Hays of Jacksonville. Colt Briston of Jacksonville was third, winning \$200, with Our Lady of Hope Parishioner Jane McKenzie of Port Orange winning \$100 for fourth.

Ms. Kenda Peterson who serves as the Mobile Operations Director for Birthline/Lifeline and has been an active presenter who visits Knights functions explaining what their care centers do throughout the diocese.

The center promotes a comprehensive sanctity of life program by offering pregnancy care services at all its locations which are free to all who qualify. Services that include pregnancy tests, limited obstetrical ultrasounds, on-going support, education classes, referrals to other community resources, material assistance for mothers and babies and adoption information.

Ms. Peterson noted, that through this support of Knights councils, their center can continue provide necessities like; counseling and certain medical care for women who need pregnancy services.

The center in Palm Beach County alone, as served two thousand clients including over five



hundred expectant parents were to their babies in the womb via ultrasound.

Supreme will issue a \$100 grant to that same center for every \$500 donation from a Knights Council. Grand Knight Ken Ida and Financial Secretary Jose Calas look forward to providing additional support for Palm Beach County's for those women that are in need. And appeal to Knights Councils to keep this program going strong promoting life across the country!

In addition to a Rosary decade, each stop included a component of Faith in Action's four components: Faith, Family, Community and Life, with a total of \$2,500 in contributions.

The ride originated at Our Lady of Hope Catholic Church in Port Orange, with a Eucharistic Adoration service and blessing of the bikes by Our Lady of Hope pastor Father Matt Mello. The Knights made a \$500 to the Volusia County F.A.I.T.H. interfaith direct-action ministry, which is chaired by Father Matt. Sir Knight Mike Godbout then led the opening decade of the

Rosary, which would be continued at each of the stops along with way.

The first stop was at the OLOH Food Pantry, with a \$500 donation to satisfy a requirement of Food For Families (Family). Next was the Basilica of St. Paul in Daytona Beach, with a \$500 donation to Outreach Human Trafficking ((Life). Bikers, followed by Knights driving cars, next stopped at St. Brendan the Navigator in Ormond Beach, with a \$500 donation to the Knights' Mobil Disabilities (Wheelchair) Fund (Community). Following a scenic ride along the famed 34-mile Loop, the journey ended at the River Grill for lunch in Ormond Beach – highlighted by the final decade of the Rosary and a \$500 donation to Florida Knights on Bikes earmarked for Vocations (Faith).

Bikers from St. Augustine to Miami were among the 29 participants at the inaugural event.

"Council 8086 did a terrific job – this event involved a huge amount of planning, and it went off without a hitch," said Bob Knapik, Florida Knights on Bikes Florida Chairman for the Orlando Diocese. "We couldn't have asked for a better day. It was very impressive They donated a lot of money to great causes."

Following lunch, the Knights were free to enjoy the many annual Biketoberfest activities in the Daytona Beach area for the remainder of the day.

Fostering Vocations

ishop Gregory Parkes speaks about the importance of fostering vocations in our parishes and provides an overview of the St. Andrew's dinner for vocations, which was held on October 24th, 2022. These comments are taken from an interview that aired on Spirit FM 90.5.

November 2, 2022 | We had a great turnout at the St. Andrew's dinner. It's an opportunity to invite primarily High School and college-age young men to a dinner with me, their bishop. It's set up to be very informal. We pray together and have dinner together. Then, several of our priests will usually give a vocation story witness. They'll talk about their own call to the priesthood, and we have a question-and-answer session. Then we end with a blessing. At the most recent dinner, we had 27 men there to learn more about priesthood. All of those aren't necessarily discerning and they're not going to necessarily become priests, but at least

they're open to the possibility and that's always a good thing.

If you see or observe a young man who is serving in ministry, maybe just say, "Have you ever thought about priesthood as a vocation?" There's no harm in asking. Just asking the question can be an affirmation to that young man. Maybe he thought about it, but maybe he didn't think that others could see him in that vocation. So, it's an affirmation to him, that maybe this is what God is calling him to do.

It's God who does the inviting, ultimately, to be a priest. It is an invitation from God but God doesn't force us. He invites us to pursue that vocation. If we do, I believe it will lead to personal happiness and fulfillment in our lives. But we must do our part as well. God puts the seed there but if we don't nurture it, don't water it, don't care for it, it's not going to grow. That's where the encouragement comes in. That's where our prayer for vocations

comes in and actively seeking and looking for young men who might be priests one day.

Knights On Bikes



y now or at some point you, as a Knight, will have heard about the Silver Rose and its transporters, The Knights on Bikes, who are also Knights of Columbus. The Silver Rose has a rich history that goes back to December 12th 1960 when a young man & Colombian Squire in council 2312 of Monterrey Mexico came up with the idea and wanted to commemorate Juan Diego and the miracle of the roses at Our Lady of Guadalupe in 1523, the Church of the apparition of Our Blessed Mother.

The young men of Council 2312 in 1960 originally utilized a living red rose given them through transport as a traveling gift. Of course

any natural rose will eventually deteriorate over time...subsequent roses were soon after traveling throughout North America made of bronze and then finally Silver. The first commemorative rose was a natural rose blessed by Bishop John C.Cody of London England it was then flown to New York where it was received by Grand Knight Joseph Thomasen and given to Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart. Mr. Hart shepherded the rose to Dallas Texas...then to Laredo Texas, through Sabinas Hidalgo by foot and to Cienega de Flores and on to the Basilica in Monterray Mexico and the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe on December 12th,1960.

Today there are 8 silver roses that travel through

North America and all 50 states, Puerto Rico, Canada and Mexico .After 1961 the Silver Rose program was adopted by the Knights of Columbus in Texas and Mexico. Later, The Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, in 2001 expanded the Silver Rose program and designated the program to become a continual program for the Knights of Columbus representing Life.The Silver Rose honors the sanctity of our Knights of Columbus Brotherhood and the sanctity of Human Life. "One Life, One Rose", said Carl Anderson. As we turn to the Blessed Mother in prayer to protect the sanctity of life, we also reaffirm our commitment to "Human Life" as Knights of Columbus.

The Knights on Bikes, who are all Knights of Columbus coincidentally started in 2005 in Ft. Worth Texas. Sir Knight Ray Medina the Founder of Knights on Bikes is from Texas and several others including Willie Davidson and Ray Galindo wanted to promote motorcycle safety through the Knights of Columbus. Today Knights on Bikes can be found throughout The United States, Canada, Mexico and the Philippines. Knights on Bikes are fellow Knights of Columbus who love riding motorcycles. Frequently, I refer to our Knights on Bikes as, "The Knights who prefer Riding over Golf". The Knights on Bikes of Florida are further blessed because the Archbishop

of Miami, Bishop Thomas Wenski is a highly enthusiastic Harley Davidson rider. In addition the Archbishop is also the Global Chaplain of Knights on Bikes while managing the Archdiocese of Miami.

Over the years The Knights on Bikes have had charge of the Silver Rose and safely securing and transporting the Silver Rose throughout North America. We in turn produce a schedule in accordance with the requests of the Diocese throughout Florida. Each rose is honored often by color guard and formal procession, Eucharistic Adoration or in some cases like Ave Maria Parish in Florida a 24 hour rosary and prayer vigil.

Attached herein is a schedule example for July/August 2022 of the myriad churches that scheduled and requested the Silver Rose in Florida overseen by Stephen Bell the President of Knights on Bikes in Florida. Each Diocese in Florida has a Diocese Chairman for Knights on Bikes. if you or your Council have an interest next year 2023 in requesting the Silver Rose scheduling starts on or about June 1st.
